Information on the Wow Wild Learn Programme

The Wow Wild Learn programme was piloted in 2016 in the Chinese language. From 2016 to 2017, about 140 pre-schools, 460 teachers and 4,500 pre-school children, as well as their parents, have benefitted from the programme. The Malay Language edition of the programme was launched in May 2018 and has since benefitted 32 pre-schools, 43 teachers and 613 pre-school children and their parents. The programme comprises five components, as illustrated below:



Teacher Training Workshop

A one-day training session for teachers will be conducted at the River Safari to equip them with the required pedagogical knowledge to develop effective lesson plans and useful teaching strategies on experiential learning. This will prepare them to conduct the learning journey at the River Safari.

"I'm a Panda Keeper" In-Park Programme

Wildlife Reserves Singapore will conduct a one-hour interactive programme for the pre-school children to learn about the pandas. The children will discover facts like the pandas' diet and daily habits. This will take place before the children embark on the learning journey.

Self-guided Learning Journey

After the in-park programme, the pre-school teachers will lead their students on the learning journey to the River Safari.

Supplementary Readers

TLLPC will also sponsor two supplementary books or readers on related topics for every participating child. Teachers will use the supplementary readers as teaching

material to engage their students during Tamil language lessons. Parents are also encouraged to use the readers to learn with their children.

Parent-Child Bonding Activities

Teachers will design parent-child activities so that students are able to involve their families in their learning journey. This can include parent-child performances using the Tamil Language and interactive activities covered in the supplementary readers.

Song CDs

TLLPC will also sponsor a song CD based on the nursery supplementary book for every participating pre-school. Teachers will use the songs to enthuse their students in the learning of the Tamil language.
